"Born in Ramleh, Israel in 1932 my family stayed behind in the country in 1948 by which we had become citizens of the State of Israel.

About the mid 1950s I joined the Hebrew University of Jerusalem as a student at the Department of Middle East History where I was introduced to Ottoman history. After graduation I joined The Middle East Centre at the University of Oxford, England and wrote my Ph.D. on "The Ottoman Province of Syria during the later Tanzimat period." After that I started to teach at the Department of Middle East history of the University of Haifa. Ottoman history was the core subject of my teaching. I stayed at this university until my retirement in 2000.

The subject which turned to be my main interest in Ottoman history and which I regard as my main contribution for understanding the post-Ottoman Middle East is the Tanzimat period. To my mind, the Tanzimat helped to shape state and society in the Ottoman lands in the following generations. I have published a collection of articles on the subject and I am presently engaged in writing a book.

My presentation today is about the emergence of a new class which came to hold power in the state following the Crimean War and which left a lasting impact on the state."
